The Plaintiff, Proposition 22 Legal Defense and Education Fund ("Fund"), submits the following proposed findings of fact. These findings are based on the expert declarations submitted in support of the Fund's motion for summary judgment. These proposed findings are submitted pursuant to this Court's order at the October 26, 2004 case management conference.

The Fund maintains that this case can be decided as a matter of law. Should the Court find it necessary to make findings of fact, however, the Fund submits the following proposed findings of fact:

- The term "marriage" has always meant the union of a man and a woman. Thomas Dyche & William Pardon, A New General English Dictionary (1740); James Buchanan, Linguae Britannicae Vera Pronunciatio (1757); Noah Webster, A Compendious Dictionary of the English Language 185 (1806); Noah Webster, An American Dictionary of the English Language 518 (1830); James Knowles, A Critical Pronouncing Dictionary of the English Language 425 (1851); Merriam Webster's Collegiate Dictionary—Tenth Edition 713 (1993). (See Proposition 22 Legal Defense and Education Fund's Appendix of Non-California Authorities, Vol I, ¶¶ 40-45).
- 2. Historically, providing a stable environment for procreation has been the primary purpose of marriage, which advances the common good and serves the public order. Carlson Decl. ¶ 4-5.
- 3. Children do best when raised by their natural parents who are bound in marriage- they are more likely to be healthy in mind and body and to succeed in school, work, and in life. They are less likely to be physically, sexually, or mentally abused, to use illegal drugs, to be involved in the juvenile justice system, to become wards of the state, or to attempt suicide. Carlson Decl. ¶ 7.
- 4. The fundamental features of marriage today have not changed since the common law definition. Carlson Decl ¶ 9.
- 5. Marriage does not merely exist to facilitate people's personal choices to enter into long-term, committed, intimate relationships. Carlson Decl. ¶ 11 (quoting Cott Decl. ¶ 50).
- 6. Marriage, as defined across all major cultures and religions, has five functions: 1) it complements nature with culture to create opposite-sex relationships that are intended to encourage birth and child rearing in the optimal environment, which is necessary for the

preservation and well being of society; 2) it provides children with a parent from each sex whenever possible; 3) it provides children with their biological parents whenever possible; 4) it brings men and women together for both practical and symbolic purposes; 5) it provides men with a stake in the family and society. Young Decl. ¶ 3.

- 7. Marriage has six universal features which include: 1) encouraging procreation under specific conditions; 2) recognizing the interdependence of men and women; 3) defining eligible partners; 4) it is supported by authority and incentives; 5) it has a public dimension; and 6) providing mutual support between both men and women, and adults and children. Young Decl. ¶¶ 5 & 48-55
- 8. Marriage, as defined by the six universal features detailed above is a universal norm. Young Decl. ¶ 23.
- 9. Marriage gives men a stake in the family and society, which encourages social stability. Young Decl. ¶ 37-40.
- 10. Marriage, as universally understood across culture and religion, is employed to encourage the birth and rearing of children within that context. Young Decl. ¶¶ 43-44.
- 11. The term "committed relationship" does not and has not equaled "marriage" in any culture or world view at any time. Young Decl. ¶¶ 58-59.
- 12. Mutual affection and companionship have never been enough to confer marriage because relationships based solely on mutual affection and companionship do not serve the cultural and societal interests served by marriage. Young Decl. ¶¶ 57-58.
- 13. There are great risks involved in redefining marriage that could have a significant impact on society and culture including risks for children; risks for boys and men; risks for women; and risks for society. Young Decl. ¶ 64.
- 14. The best environment for raising children is provided by an opposite-sex couple who are married. Rekers Decl. ¶ 5.
- 15. Children do best when raised by a parent of each sex. Young Decl. ¶¶ 29 & 65.
- 16. Children do best when they are raised by their biological parents. Young Decl. ¶¶ 18 & 65.
- 17. Children living outside two-biological parent married families tend to exhibit more behavioral and emotional problems than those who live within two-parent biological married families. Rekers Decl. ¶¶ 8 & 9 (citing Susan L. Brown, Family Structure and Child Well-Being: The Significance of Parental Cohabitation, 66 Journal of Marriage and

Famil 351-367 (2004); Timothy J. Biblarz & Greg Gottainer, Family Structure and Children's Success, 62 Journal of Marriage and the Family 533-548 (2000)).

- 18. Children who do not live with both their mother and father experience significantly higher incidence of adverse child and adolescent outcomes, including lowered academic performance, more cognitive deficits, increased adjustment problems, greater susceptibility to delinquent peer groups, more conduct problems, higher rates of illicit drug and alcohol use, higher rates of suicide and homicide, deficits in social problem solving and competencies, deficits in social sensitivity, deficits in social role-taking skills, a poor self-concept, low self esteem, lowered self confidence, less sense of mastery, less self-assertiveness, delayed emotional and social maturity, and increased sexual promiscuity. Rekers Decl. ¶ 11.
- 19. A positive and continuous relationship with a father is associated with a good self-concept, higher self-esteem, higher self-confidence in personal and social interaction, higher levels of moral maturity, reduced rates of unwed teen pregnancy, greater internal control, and higher career aspirations. Rekers Decl. ¶ 13.
- 20. A father's positive effects are independent of the effects of the mother's influence. Rekers Decl. ¶ 14.
- Mothers have influence on their children independent of a father's influence in the development of prosocial behavior, peer acceptance, and cooperative play with peers, which effects how socially well-adjusted children are inside and outside the home. Rekers Decl. ¶ 17 & 18.
- 22. The natural family structure of dual-gender, married mothers and fathers provides greater benefits for nearly every aspect of children's well-being, including better emotional and physical health, less substance abuse, lower rates of early sexual activity by girls, better educational opportunity, and less delinquency for boys. Rekers Decl. ¶ 19.
- 23. Families headed by same-sex couples deprive a child of either the unique positive contributions of a father or the unique positive contributions of a mother. Rekers Decl. ¶ 23.
- 24. Children who are raised by opposite-sex couples who are married do far better socially and educationally than children raised by cohabiting homosexual or heterosexual couples in almost every category including language development, mathematics achievement, interest and involvement in sports, sociability, homework, and personal autonomy. Rekers Decl. ¶ 24.
- 25. Multiple reviews by psychologists and other social scientists have documented fatal flaws in the research methods of virtually all of the studies that claim there is no difference in
